## Remarks delivered by Dorothy Sander, Special Recognition Honoree

Wow. Thank you so much for your support and your acknowledgement for what I've been doing for a very long time. And thanks to my good buddy, Todd Larson, for all those accolades.

As my friends know, I've been on many boards over the last three decades; and most of the non-profit boards I sat on were gay and lesbian organizations. I believe that Board work is another form of activism. It's a way to help lead the charge, and help lead the charge to assist those activists who are on the ground, fighting everyday for our rights.
